The special meeting was called to order by Chair Lisa Parker at 3:30 p.m. Chair Lisa Parker, Trustee Rosalinda Mendoza and Trustee Sara Cate were present. Trustees Robert Ozuna and Patricia Whitefoot were absent. (excused)

A. Tenure Review Process

Mr. Tomás Ybarra, Vice President of Instruction and Student Services, presented on the tenure review process. Tenure is a faculty appointment for an indefinite period of time which may be revoked only for adequate cause and by due process. He discussed the history of tenure, the RCWs and the bargaining agreement that influence the tenure process. Mr. Ybarra shared that recently there have been a series of productive meetings with the ASYVCC to clarify the selection of the student member of the tenure review committee which were beneficial to all parties.

B. Financial Statement Audit

Dr. Teresa Rich, Vice President of Administrative Services presented on YVCC's first audit report and financial statements. In order to maintain accreditation with Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities (NWCCU) colleges are required to have independently audited financial statements. In the past YVCC's financial information was consolidated with all Washington State community colleges and audited as part of the state of Washington consolidated annual financial report. State Auditors were on campus from the middle of October until the end of December auditing the details of YVCCs 2013/14 financial statements. In January they returned to conduct an exit conference and provided the college with the results of our audit. Dr. Rich was happy to announce that the auditors did not find any deficiencies. Dr. Rich presented the board with a copy of YVCC's audit report and YVCC's 2013/14 Financial Report. Dr. Rich complimented Ms. Clarissa Wolfe, Director of Accounting Services, and her team for their hard work in preparation for and during the audit. A copy of the reports are filed with these minutes in the President's office.

Ms. Sara Fielding, Transforming Lives Nominee. Ms. Lisa Parker, congratulated Ms. Fielding on her selection as YVCC's nominee for the transforming lives award. Ms. Fielding was presented with a medallion and a check from the Board of Trustees.

- B. **Proposed Changes to the Agenda.** There were no changes to the agenda.
- C. Approval of Minutes: Trustee Mendoza moved that the minutes of the Special and Regular Meetings of January 13, 2016, be approved as submitted. The motion was seconded by Trustee Cate and passed unanimously.

D. Action Items

1. Approval of the 2013-2014 Audited Financial Statements.

Dr. Teresa Rich, stated that in 2010 the Northwest Commission for Colleges and Universities changed their regional accreditation standards and now require all colleges and universities, they accredit, to have audited financial statements. To meet this new accreditation requirement YVCC prepared 2013-2014 financial statements and during fall of 2015 those statements were audited by the Washington State Auditor's Office (SAO). At the conclusion of the audit SAO presented an unqualified opinion on the financial statements.

A requirement of board oversight is that the financial statements and audit report be reviewed by the Board and that the financial statements be approved before being made publically available. The Independent Auditor's Report was received on January 15, 2016, and was presented for board review at the February 18, 2016, study session, along with the 2013-2014 Financial Statements.

After having successfully completed its first financial statement audit, the college is now requesting the 2013-2014 Financial Statements be approved.

MOTION 16-02-01: Trustee Cate moved that the Board of Trustees adopt a motion to approve the 2013-2014 Audited Financial Statements presented at the February 18, 2016 study session. The motion was seconded by Trustee Mendoza and passed unanimously.

2. Exceptional Faculty Awards Winter 2016.

Mr. Tomás Ybarra provided the board with the Faculty Development Committee's recommendations for exceptional faculty awards (EFA) for winter 2016. He also indicated that the committee had taken into consideration the board's suggestions to prioritize awards to individual who had not received an award in the past.

He stated that The Washington State Legislature under RCW 28B.50.835 authorized an exceptional faculty award program to "foster partnerships by creating matching grant programs to assist public community and technical colleges in creating endowments for funding exceptional faculty awards." In 1992, Yakima Valley Community College and the YVCC Foundation agreed to participate in the program for exceptional faculty.

In 2001, in accordance with RCW 28B.50.843, the college negotiated a Memorandum of Understanding with the faculty union regarding the process for determining local awards from the Exceptional Faculty Awards fund invested by the YVCC Foundation. The MOU reflected the division structure in place at that time.

The faculty union executive board and the college have agreed on a Faculty Development Committee that reflects the current division structure. The committee is composed of one dean, one Arts & Sciences faculty, one Workforce Education faculty, one Basic Skills faculty, and one librarian. This committee received and reviewed six (6) faculty proposals for winter 2016. The final recommendations for the board's approval will be submitted at the board meeting.

MOTION 16-02-02: Trustee Mendoza moved that the Board of Trustees adopts a motion to approve the recommended award amounts to the recipients as submitted by the Faculty Development Committee. The motion was seconded by Trustee Cate and passed unanimously.

E. **Communications:** There were no communications.

F. Reports

1. **Board of Trustees**

Trustee Cate gave a report on the New Trustee Orientation that she and President Kaminski had attended on January 24th. She stated it was helpful to meet other new trustees and she gained insight on the overall picture regarding the role of trustees.

Ms. Lisa Parker, Chair reported on the Transforming Lives dinner on January 24th and her participation on the selection committee. Five students were selected and they shared their amazing stories at the awards dinner.

Chair Parker also reported on the ACT Winter conference on January 25th which was also attended by Trustee Cate and President Kaminski.

Two week later Ms. Parker and President Kaminski attended the ACCT/AACC 2016 National Legislative Summit. Ms. Parker indicated that the summit was very beneficial and she was able to spend some time speaking with representatives and senators regarding issues concerning community colleges.

6. Vice President for Administrative Services

Dr. Rich stated that this might be the last budget status report Ms. Morehead presents to the board prior to her upcoming retirement in April. She stated that Ms. Morehead's years of service with the college are very much appreciated and she will be missed.

Operating Budget Status Report. Ms. Judy Morehead, Director of Budget Services, presented the YVCC Fiscal Report July 1, 2015 through December 31, 2015. There were a few adjustments to operations in Basic Skills Enhancement, Aero Space Apprentice, Student Achievement (SAI), and reserve use. Ms. Morehead reported that spending and tuitions were in line with predictions. She also stated that the budget is close and in the spring things might be off a little. Ms. Morehead stated that it has been a joy to work for the college and it has been an inspiring environment to work in. A copy of her report is filed with these minutes in the President's office.

7. Vice President for Instruction and Student Services

Mr. Tomás Ybarra provided the board with an update on pathways advising. He reported that 558 students were required to participate and that there were only 73 that did not show up (13%). Advisors are conducting a robust follow up with those 73 students. He stated that the future calendar is still under negotiation and because of that no future advising dates have been set. Chair Parker stated how much the Board appreciates the regular updates on the process.

8. **President**

Human Resource Activity Report. Director of Human Resource Services, Mr. Mark Rogstad provided the board with an update on the negotiation process. He stated that the negotiation process usually takes up to three months and most of the work takes place in the last 10% of that time. Mr. Rogstad indicated that Vice President Ybarra has been working with the faculty and the process has been moving along. Mr. Rogstad stated that he hopes to present the faculty contract next month.

President's Report. 1) Dr. Kaminski shared a letter from Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities (NWCCU) granting YVCC with initial accreditation at the baccalaureate level effective September 1, 2015. 2) She provided the board with an excerpt from the Washington State Community & Technical Colleges field guide for 2015-16 which highlights each community college in the state. 3) Dr. Kaminski discussed the Transforming Lives Award booklet. 4) She provided the board with the updated FTE Census report & FTE Allocation report which are a snap shot in time of our current enrollment. Currently our numbers are trending down from last year. 5) Dr. Kaminski briefly discussed her attendance at the Transforming Lives Awards, ACT Winter Conference and the ACCT/AACC Legislative Summit.

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the business-type activities and the aggregate discretely presented component units of the Yakima Valley Community College, Yakima County, Washington, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2014, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the College's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated January 15, 2016.

Our report includes a reference to other auditors who audited the financial statements of the Foundation of Yakima Valley Community College, as described in our report on the College's financial statements. This report includes our consideration of the results of the other auditor's testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and other matters that are reported on separately by those other auditors. However, this report, insofar as it relates to the results of the other auditors, is based solely on the reports of the other auditors. The Foundation of Yakima Valley Community College prior year comparative information has been derived from the Foundation's 2013 basic financial statements, on which other auditors issued their report dated November 7, 2013.

The financial statements of the Yakima Valley Community College, an agency of the state of Washington, are intended to present the financial position, and the changes in financial position, and where applicable, cash flows of only the respective portion of the activities of the state of Washington that is attributable to the transactions of the College and its aggregate discretely presented component units. They do not purport to, and do not, present fairly the financial position of the state of Washington as of June 30, 2014, the changes in its financial position, or where applicable, its cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the College's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the College's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the College's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the College's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we and the other auditors did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the College's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of the College's compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

The results of our tests and the report of the other auditors disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

PURPOSE OF THIS REPORT

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the College's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed

in accordance with Government Auditing Standards in considering the College's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose. However, this report is a matter of public record and its distribution is not limited. It also serves to disseminate information to the public as a reporting tool to help citizens assess government operations.

REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the business-type activities and the aggregate discretely presented component units of the Yakima Valley Community College, Yakima County, Washington, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2014, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the College's basic financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We did not audit the financial statement of the Foundation of Yakima Valley Community College, which represents 100 percent of the assets, net position and revenues of the aggregate discretely presented component units. Those financial statements were audited by other auditors whose report thereon has been furnished to us, and our opinion, insofar as it relates to amounts included for the Foundation of Yakima Valley Community College, is based solely on the report of the other auditors. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the College's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the College's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audit and the report of the other auditors, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the business-type activities and the aggregate discretely presented component units of the Yakima Valley Community College, as of June 30, 2014, and the respective changes in financial position and, where applicable, cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Matters of Emphasis

As discussed in Note 1, the financial statements of the Yakima Valley Community College, an agency of the state of Washington, are intended to present the financial position, and the changes in financial position, and where applicable, cash flows of only the respective portion of the activities of the state of Washington that is attributable to the transactions of the College and its aggregate discretely presented component units. They do not purport to, and do not, present fairly the financial position of the state of Washington as of June 30, 2014, the changes in its financial position, or where applicable, its cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

Other Matters

Report on Summarized Comparative Information

The financial statements include partial prior-year comparative information for the Foundation of Yakima Valley Community College. Such information does not include all of the information required for a presentation in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Foundation's financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2013, from which such partial information was derived. Other auditors have previously audited the Foundation's 2013 financial statements and they expressed an unmodified opinion in their audit report dated November 7, 2013.

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

OTHER REPORTING REQUIRED BY GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated January 15, 2016 on our consideration of the College's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters.
